

Spring Home Learning Challenge



Go for a walk with a grown-up and look out for any signs of spring. You could draw a picture to show everyone what you saw.



During spring, lots of animals have their babies. Find out the names of these baby animals: pig, sheep and duck.



Draw a picture of a flower. Remember to draw some petals, a stem and some leaves on your flower.

During spring, seeds begin to grow. In the story of Jack and the Beanstalk, Jack's beans grow into a magic beanstalk. Tell the story of Jack and the beanstalk with a grown-up at home. You could even act the story out together!



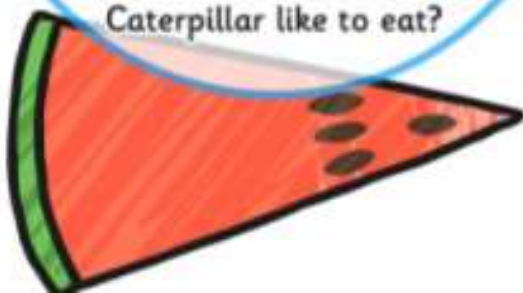
The Very Hungry Caterpillar

Home Learning Challenge

The Very Hungry Caterpillar loves to eat lots of different foods. What is your favourite food? Draw a picture of your favourite food and write a sentence to tell us about it.



Try some of the different fruits mentioned in the story. Which one is your favourite? You could try some apples, pears, strawberries, oranges, plums or watermelon. You could also try some other fruits – what other fruit might The Very Hungry Caterpillar like to eat?



The Very Hungry Caterpillar eats 2 pears and 3 plums. How many pieces of fruit did he eat altogether? You could use your fingers or draw a picture to help you.



Draw or paint a picture of a caterpillar or a butterfly. What colours do you need? What different parts do you need to draw? Talk to an adult about your picture.

Butterfly Life Cycle

Home Learning Challenge



Take a walk around a garden, park or outside area. Can you find any butterflies or caterpillars? Try looking around some plants and flowers or under some leaves. You could draw a picture or take a photo of any you find.

Try making a model caterpillar or butterfly! You could use playdough, paper, empty cardboard boxes or tubes, yoghurt pots or plastic bottles.



There are 5 butterflies on a leaf. If 3 fly away, how many would be left on the leaf? You could use your fingers or draw a picture to help you.



Look at the pictures of the life cycle of a butterfly. Can you put them into the correct order? Talk about the life cycle together.

Frog Life Cycle

Home Learning Challenge

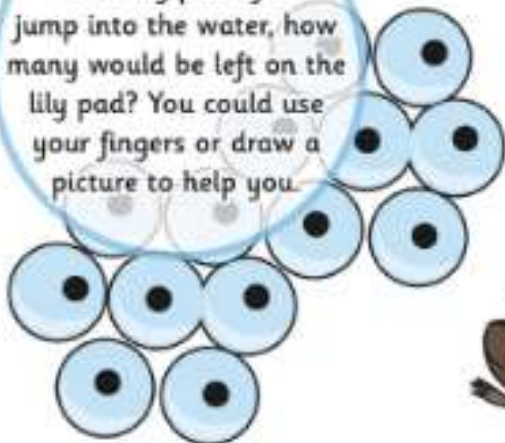
Look at the pictures of the life cycle of a frog. Can you put them into the correct order? Talk about what happens in the life cycle. Try using these words: frogspawn, tadpole, froglet, frog.



Try making a model about part of the life cycle of a frog! You could use playdough, paper, empty cardboard boxes or tubes, yoghurt pots or plastic bottles. You could make frogspawn, a tadpole, a froglet or frog.



There are 6 frogs on a lily pad. If 3 jump into the water, how many would be left on the lily pad? You could use your fingers or draw a picture to help you.



Frogs are very good at jumping! Show someone at home how good you are at jumping – remember to bend your knees!



Plant Life Cycles

Home Learning Challenge

Look at some plants and flowers growing in a park or a garden. Can you see different parts of the life cycle? Can you see any seeds? Have flowers grown yet? Draw or paint a picture of your favourite plant or flower.

Katie plants 3 seeds in the ground. Then Michael plants 2 seeds. How many seeds have they planted altogether? You could use your fingers or draw a picture to help you.

Have a look at some packets of seeds in a garden centre or supermarket. What different types of seeds can you find? Can you see what the seeds will grow into?

Try planting some seeds or bulbs in a pot. Some plants take a long time to grow but others, like cress seeds, can grow quite quickly. Remember to give your seeds or bulbs some water and put them somewhere sunny. What do you think will happen next?
